MESSAGE FROM TRANSPORT FOR GREATER MANCHESTER



To support the safe return of pupils to school, TfGM will be running approximately 300 additional bus journeys each weekday across the region. Duplicate buses, exclusively for school and college students and staff will run up to 5 minutes behind scheduled services at set times. The usual route number starting in 'S' will indicate that the bus is a school service. These buses are separate to existing dedicated school bus services and TfGM's yellow school bus services.

Year 11 - Mr Smith

Welcome Back Year 11! It has been lovely to see you all this Friday after so long away from school. I hope you are now raring to go again particularly as we go into the final and most important year of your Dean Trust Ardwick journey. We already start the year with celebration as nine pupils from our year group received their GCSE language results in August; eight pupils gained a grade 9 and one pupil gained a grade 8 making it 89% grade 9s - Well done! Hopefully this is a sign of what will follow and your focus and desire to succeed will be demonstrated throughout the year.

Results Day 2020

The first cohort of Dean Trust Ardwick pupils have now received their Key Stage 4 results and we are incredibly proud of their achievements and the opportunities that these qualifications will now provide for them. The results demonstrate the incredible success our school has had over its first five years of serving this community.

As you will be aware, the method through which pupils' grades were awarded this year was adapted; teachers were asked to use a range of evidence to determine the most likely grade a pupil would have achieved were they to have sat their external exams. This process was enacted by our team with the utmost integrity, professionalism and expertise and culminated with six tiers of quality assurance including at a cross-Trust level. Therefore, it is with full confidence that these results reflect the high standards and quality of both the teaching and learning and our welfare provision for our pupils at Dean Trust Ardwick.

Our key headlines:

- 12 of our pupils achieved at least 1 grade 9 including 1 pupil who achieved seven grade 9s and one grade 8
- 3 of our pupils achieved 14 grade 9s and 14 grade 8s between them
- 11 out of 16 pupils achieved grade 9s in additional language qualifications
- In Maths, 23.3% of pupils achieved grade 7 or above which is the highest across the Dean Trust
- 75.8% of pupils achieved grades 9-4 in English
- 75% of pupils achieved grades 9-4 in Maths
- 58.3% of pupils achieved a grade 5 or above in Maths (18% higher than the Manchester average in 2019)
- 58.3% of our pupils entered the English Baccalaureate and 41.7% of them achieved a standard pass which is the highest percentage across the Dean Trust Schools
- 25.8% of those entered, achieved a strong pass across the English Baccalaureate
- Our Value Added scores in Science, Languages and Humanities are the highest within the Trust
- Results suggest that pupils at Dean Trust Ardwick make the most progress between key stage 2 and 4 within the

At Dean Trust Ardwick, ensuring the quality of teaching and learning in every classroom for all our pupils is of vital importance and the outstanding results above, across all qualifications, is a testament to the consistent high standards which we have. I am incredibly proud of our Year 11 leavers and the entire staff team here for their hard work, commitment and dedication to the success of the young people in our care.

Finally, I wanted to pass on my gratitude to the parents and carers of our 2020 cohort, with whom the school have built strong relationships and we have benefitted from their continuous support over the five year journey.



I feel privileged to be joining such a warm and wonderful community and look forward to getting to know you and your child over the coming weeks.



SECONDARY EDUCATION TRAVEL INFORMATION PACK

RETURNING TO COLLEGE — AUTUMN TERM 2020

As your family begin to prepare for the return to school in September, or your child is starting secondary school for the first time, you will be starting to think about how the coronavirus pandemic may affect your travel plans.

How we travel around Greater Manchester has changed so you will need to think ahead about how and when your child will travel, to make sure they arrive safely and on time.

Public transport services have limited space due to social distancing measures, and with more people returning to work and school in September, traffic will increase.

One way to help reduce congestion is to walk and cycle to school if possible. Walking and cycling to school is a healthy way to travel and frees up space on services for those pupils who need to use public transport.

If you do need to use public transport, TfGM and public transport operators have put more measures in place to help you travel safely, including enhanced cleaning, extra services and passenger information and signage. We are working closely with our partners to ensure that your network is as safe, clean and reliable as possible. We have risk assessed our service in-line with Government advice and put in measures to increase social distancing as well as ensuring buses, trams and trains are deep cleaned more regularly. Hand sanitiser dispensers are located at interchanges, bus stations and at key Metrolink stops.

This travel information pack provides guidance to enable you to make informed decisions about your child's journey to and from school and help you plan ahead. For the latest updates on local restrictions and how this affects travel, visit tfgm.com/coronavirus.

Things to Consider

How does your child currently travel to school? How will they travel to school in September? Will they be looking to travel differently than usual?

Public Transport

Bus

If your child needs to travel by public transport, space will be limited on many services due to social distancing. Capacity is reduced to half and **services will**



operate on a one-off, one-on basis, meaning you might have to wait longer for a bus that has free space for you.

Commercial bus, train, tram and rail services are all running as many services as possible to support those returning to school and work in September and increase social distancing.

To support you and your children in your journeys to and from school in September, TfGM have received additional Government funding to provide extra transport for back to school services where required.

Yellow School Buses

- Your child can use the Yellow School bus service if you live within Greater Manchester and they go to a school that's served by Yellow Bus. See which schools use the yellow bus service.
- Usually you need to apply for a yellow school bus pass via TfGM before the start of the new school year, but due to the coronavirus pandemic, TfGM won't be issuing passes for the new academic year in September.
